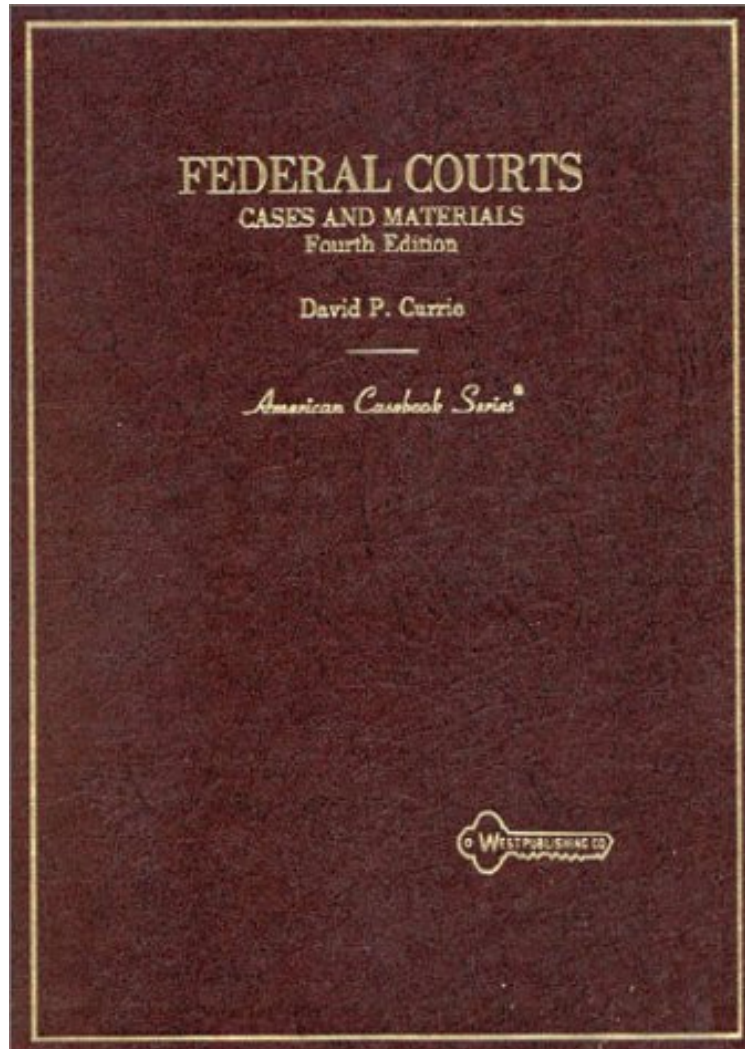

While many of the main cases are still good law, many of the note cases have been overruled or modified by more recent decisions. This book really shows its age when you reach the section on the 11th Amendment as you will find that the Rehnquist Court made sweeping changes in this area.Despite its age this book is still well organized, presenting fed jur in a manner that allows for the student to understand the sometimes many confusing aspects such as Fed Question jurisdiction and Erie.If your professor makes you use this text, you had better hope that he supplements the materials with current caselaw.If you want to buy a supplement for this text, I recommend the treatise by Chermensky.0 of 0 people found the following review helpful. Spells out the basic contours of district court jurisdiction in federal question, admiralty, and diversity cases, with notes on venue and on the Supreme Court's original jurisdiction. Tells the student something about the applicable law governing federal proceedings, including remedies against government officers. Deals with limitations on the exercise of jurisdiction that cuts across the various jurisdictional categories: sovereign and official immunities and a variety of statutory and judicial abstention doctrines. Follows the litigant into situations in which a federal court is asked to pass upon what another tribunal has already done.
